Dress Code: Proper golf attire is required on the course and practice area. Shorts, skirts, or slacks are acceptable attire. The lower edge of the hem on shorts or skirts may not be more than four inches above the top of the knee. Short shorts, miniskirts, and tank tops are not considered proper attire.

Golf Etiquette: Players should play without delay. An open hole ahead automatically dictates that faster players be permitted to go through. Leave the green immediately when play is completed. Mark your scorecard at the next tee.

Golf Carts: Golf carts must always stay on cart paths when red flags are displayed at the pro shop and on the golf course. When the red flags are not displayed, golf carts may be driven off the cart path at a right angle, directly to the ball, and parked either in the rough or on the fairway. As soon as the ball is played, the cart should exit the fairway or rough and proceed to the cart path or to the next ball position; whichever is closest. Use the most direct route making every effort to reduce golf cart traffic on the fairways and rough. Use the cart path whenever possible.

Always observe the following rules:

- Do not drive parallel to the fairways in the rough.
- Obey all instructional signs.
- Do not drive on grounds under repair or within 30 feet of hazards, greens, and tees, unless on cart path.
- Never park the cart in front of a green while putting.
- Handcarts must be kept 30 feet from the greens.
- Never pull a handcart between a bunker and the green.

Counting Strokes. Golf is not a team sport. Scoring is individual. Each player is responsible for counting her own strokes; however, mistakes are made. That's why someone else keeps track on the scorecard. The player does not write down her own score. If the player and marker disagree on a score, the marker should bring it up immediately. If the two can't agree in a few seconds, check with others in the foursome. Don't slow the pace of play...move on. The marker should not sign the scorecard at the end of the round if a disagreement still exists. Both player and marker are disqualified in tournaments if a marker knowingly signs a card with errors. A good way to avoid issues before the ball is holed is to announce the number of strokes taken by each player upon entering the green. "On in 3" for example. Then continue to count putts for the hole total.
